for the financial year ended 31 December 2020

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2020.

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the company is to assist young people to refrain from anti social behaviour and to encourage them in activities that enrich their lives and that of their communities through the operation of a community development scheme in the Ballyfermot and Cherry Orchard area.

Principal activities of the company during 2020 were to:

- Key work individuals on a one-to-one basis to identify needs, support behaviour change, and support access to appropriate services as part of their care-plan.
- Provide practical and emotional supports to deal with Gardai/Justice issues and Housing/Homelessness. Clients present with a number of complex issues including mental health, substance use, poverty, domestic violence and other trauma related challenges.
- Provide crisis intervention dealing with suicidal ideation, domestic violence, intimidation, eviction, and other emergency interventions.
- Advocate with our clients to state agencies and other relevant services.
- Establish an inhouse counselling service (August 2020)
- Organised resilience and life skills training programme with the 'I Can' group in conjunction with St Ultan's. The training schedule was significantly reduced due to Covid restrictions throughout 2020.
- Partner with An Cosan to provide an online Business Administration Training (QQI Level 5) which is facilitated virtually with six participants by a tutor from An Cosán: the programme began in September, 2020 and runs until December, 2021.
- Provide on the job training to a community member an administrative assistant started in September 2020 on a Community Employment Scheme.

The company is anticipating changes in 2021 as the Board of Management have decided to explore a merger. It was important to the Board that the company merged with an organisation with a focus on Cherry Orchard. Two organisations expressed an interest and one of them is being explored further as it was deemed to be in line with our purpose. We received a grant from the Community Foundation of Ireland to engage Quality matters to negotiate the merger, which began in April 2021.

The company adopted its trading name Blue Door, which will support our community to engage more with our organisation; our intention is to become a hub for our community and local groups.

The Company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

The liability of the members is limited. Every member of the company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while they are members or within one year thereafter for the payment of debts and liabilities of the company contracted before they cease to be members and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors among themselves for such amount as may be required not exceeding €2.

Financial Results

The (deficit)/surplus for the financial year after providing for depreciation amounted to €(3,060) (2019 - €5,464).

At the end of the financial year, the company has assets of €32,218 (2019 - €48,402) and liabilities of €13,299 (2019 - €26,423). The net assets of the company have decreased by €(3,060).

The Company remains providing services to its clients by email, telephone and other electronic means.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Ballyfermot Social Intervention Initiative CLG t/a Blue Door ('the company') for the financial year ended 31 December 2020 which comprise the Profit and Loss Account, the Balance Sheet, the Reconciliation of Members' Funds, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. GENERAL INFORMATION 1.

Ballyfermot Social Intervention Initiative CLG t/a Blue Door is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. Company Number 365186. The registered office of the company is 83 Cherry Orchard Crescent, Cherry Orchard, Dublin 10 which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES 2.

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2020 have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 Section 1A (Small Entities) and the Companies Act 2014.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" Section 1A, issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

The company qualifies as a small company as defined by section 280A of the Companies Act 2014 in respect of the financial year, and has applied the rules of the 'Small Companies Regime' in accordance with section 280C of the Companies Act 2014 and Section 1A of FRS 102.

Income represents revenue received from a number of sources and mainly in the form of grants received in contribution to the general and specific expenses of the organisation. Revenue is recognised as received, however when income is received with regard to specific activities, this income is recognised when the relating expenditure has been incurred.

Donations by their nature are not subject to verification until they are received and recorded. Therefore, this income is only recognised upon receipt and entry to the company's accounting system.

Grants are credited to deferred revenue. Grants towards revenue expenditure are released to the profit and loss account as the related expenditure is incurred.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

20% Straight line

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits with banks and bank Cash and cash equivalents overdrafts. In the Balance Sheet bank overdrafts are shown within Creditors.

Trade and other creditors

Trade and other creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Taxation

No charge to Corporation Tax arises as this company is a registered charity. Charity Number CHY 15471.

Government grants

Capital grants received and receivable are treated as deferred income and amortised to the Profit and Loss Account annually over the useful economic life of the asset to which it relates. Revenue grants are credited to the Profit and Loss Account when received.

3. GOING CONCERN

The activities of the company are largely financed by the receipt of grant aid from Department of Health, Drug Prevention Unit as allocated by City of Dublin Youth Services Board and Dublin City Council. This funding will be continued until 31 December 2020 but no assurances can be provided in respect of periods after that date.

Since 31 December 2019, the spread of COVID-19 has severely impacted on many local economies around the world. On 28th March in response to Government guidelines for social distancing efforts related to the spread of COVID-19, the Company decided that it would temporarily close the office and reopening remains unclear at this time. The staff remains in contact with its clients, suppliers and funders by email, telephone and other electronic means.

The directors believe that it would be extremely difficult for the company to continue in its current operational mode without the continued financial support of City of Dublin Youth Services Board and Dublin City Council. Should there be a reduction in funding from these agencies, the directors are confident that they will be able to reduce costs accordingly to ensure that ongoing expenses are in line with recurring incomes.

On that basis of all of the above, the directors, after making enquires, have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue operating for the foreseeable future having regarding to the company's income prospects and a review of finances for the next twelve months from the date of signing the financial statements. For this reason, the going concern basis continues to be adopted in preparing the financial statements.
